#### <u>Intent</u>


At St Nicholas, we value Art and Design as an integral part of our pupils' entitlement to a broad and balanced curriculum. Art and Design provides the children with the opportunities to develop and extend skills and an opportunity to express their individual interests, thoughts and ideas; we recognise how the subject embodies some of the highest forms of human creativity. We intend to provide a high-quality Art and Design education which engages, inspires and challenges our pupils, equipping them with the knowledge and skills to experiment, invent and create their own works of art, craft and design. As pupils progress, they should be able to think critically and develop a more rigorous understanding of Art and Design. They should also know how Art and Design both reflect and shape our history, and contribute to the culture, creativity and wealth of our nation. We aim to give every pupil the opportunity to develop their ability, nurture their talents and interests, express their ideas and thoughts about the world, as well as learning about artists across cultures and through history.

### Patron Saint of Art is St Catherine of Bologna. We ask St. Catherine to pray for us.

St. Catherine of Bologna was an Italian nun and artist who lived in the 15th century and was known for her artistic talent and spiritual devotion. She was a talented painter, musician, and writer, and is said to have used her artistic gifts to illustrate and explain the teachings of the Catholic Church. Her beautifully painted miniatures are preserved at the convent of Corpo di Cristo in Bologna to this day.

Saint Catherine is the patron saint of artists because of her artistic talent and her devotion to using her gifts for religious purposes. She is also considered to be a model of spiritual devotion, humility, and obedience, and is revered by many as a saint who lived a life of service to God. She continues to inspire artists, art lovers, and spiritual seekers around the world.



### **Implementation**

Children are taught the skills of the National Curriculum over three units per year. These units are carefully matched to the age related skills that children should be able to demonstrate and to support this, pupils have the opportunity to revisit skills across year groups. Many of our Art and Design units are cross-curricular and consolidate learning in wider areas such as History, Geography and Science, which allow pupils to embed their skills through deeper and more meaningful learning opportunities. Years 2, 3, 4 and 6 are taught a bespoke unit which directly reflects their learning in the foundation subjects.
